

Milton Creagh is the former host of the national PBS television series, "Parenting Works!" His television work dates back to the early 90's, when he created and hosted the Emmy-nominated teen talk show, "Atlanta Teen Talk", on WPBA-TV 30 in Atlanta. Later collaboration with WPBA yielded a dance/talk format for teens (In Effect!) and two prime time specials: "The Black Male: An Endangered Species" and "Atlanta Facing AIDS". Creagh was also featured in three nationally syndicated television specials for MTI/Coronet Films: "Trap: Selling Drugs in the Inner City", "Prejudice: Dividing the Dream", and "Diversity in the USA". Creagh also developed and hosted the video based training program, "Parent to Parent" for PRIDE Youth Programs and wrote and hosted the docu-drama, "Masquerade: Unveiling Our Deadly Dance With Drugs and Alcohol".

He has been featured in magazines and media outlets as diverse as Fox News Network, CNN, "Focus On The Family" magazine (cover story), the urban teen fan magazine "Right On!", the magazine for upwardly mobile young African Americans, "Upscale", and the nationally broadcast Canadian television series, "100 Huntley Street". He has spoken in 49 of the 50 states, and throughout the Caribbean, Canada, South America and South Africa.

A 6'7", 300-lb. former college football standout with a lively sense of humor, "Big Milt" makes a big impact with his straight talk about important challenges facing young people, families and modern society.

Guadalupe Lara comes to us from Detroit, Michigan where she has dedicated the last 27 years to advocating for children and families at Children's Hospital of Michigan. She has held a variety of positions, from Director of Social Work to Corporate Director of Community Programs for the eight hospitals of the Detroit Medical Center. Ms. Lara is currently the President of the National Association of Social Workers, Michigan Chapter and their 8000 social workers.

Ms. Lara is a motivational speaker who has been recognized for her work by over 43 organizations and has been named by four different Michigan governors to lead boards and commissions. She has been invited to present her work all over the United States, Norway, Mexico, and Canada.

She has developed video presentations that build skills for serving diverse populations and for managing conflict in the workplace that leads to a peaceful dialogue and respect for differences. Ms. Lara has developed her work in both English and Spanish to build peaceful relationships in both families and communities. Ms. Lara is originally from San Antonio, Texas and proudly calls both Detroit and San Antonio home.


