Her speaking engagements have included institutes and seminars at universities and colleges, state and national conferences on education, prevention, juvenile justice, student assistance and numerous schools, organizations, communities and churches.



Stuart L. Brown, M.D.

President The National Institute for Play

Trained in general and internal medicine, psychiatry and clinical research, Stuart Brown first recognized the importance of play by discovering its absence in the life stories of murderers and felony drunken drivers. His years of clinical practice affirmed the importance and need for healthy play throughout the human life cycle, and his later evaluation of highly creative individuals revealed the centrality of playfulness to their success and well-being.

His recent years of independent scholarship



and exploration of the evolution of human and animal play have helped to focus a central commitment bringing the promises and stories of play into general cultural consciousness and to the establishment of the

Institute for Play. The mission of the Institute for Play (IFP) is to bring the unrealized knowledge, practices and benefits of play into public life. Dr. Brown was the instigator and Executive Producer of the three-part PBS series, "The Promise of Play."

His experience as medical administrator, producer, and scientific consultant or creator to numerous other productions on Joseph Campbell, Cosmology, Animal Play, plus his scientific and popular writings have identified him as the foremost "practical champion of the knowledge of play."

Session A Workshops

Monday, November 16, 2009 2:00-3:15 p.m.

A-1 Resilience

Resilience can be defined as, "The capacity to spring back, rebound, successfully adapt in the face of adversity, and develop social competence despite exposure to severe stress." This workshop will focus on the "how-to's" of resilience. It will take a closer look at the Kauai Longitudinal Study on Resilience and the protective factors that have been proven by research to make a difference in the lives of "at promise" children and youth. A-2 First Steps



The First Steps Early Language Program presents the basics to support language development in infants and toddlers. This session will utilize the DVD "Connecting with Every Child" to take participants through the four steps of beginning language, reading the child's mes-

sages, talking with young children, and building conversations. It is designed for workers and caregivers in day care centers, Head Start centers, preschools, and other early childhood settings. A focus will be on how they work with parents to improve their children's language development.

A-3 The Importance of Fathers

Research on fathers and the effects they have on child development has historically lagged behind research on mothers. However, available research consistently finds that the more fathers are involved with their children, the better the developmental and school outcomes are for children. This workshop will help practitioners reach out to fathers. Participants will be provided with research on the importance of fathers, tips for fathers that encourage specific things they can do with their preschool children to help them prepare for school success, and resources for more information on father involvement.

A-5 Cyberbullying: What You Need to Know

Cyberbullying is tormenting, harassing, embarrassing, or humiliating someone through an electronic medium. It can range from forwarding a private instant message conversation, posting an embarrassing video online, or creating an entire profile or message thread to make fun of and harass another person. With the perception of anonymity provided by the Internet, young people are posting rude and harmful comments and material without really understanding the long-term effects of their interaction. This session will discuss the damage this can cause, some of the legal ramifications, and what to do if it is happening to you or someone vou know.

A-6 Supplemental Education Services



The Supplemental Educational Services (SES) after school tutoring program's goal is to have schools, parents and SES providers work together to improve student achievement in reading, math and science for K-12 students in Title 1 schools who are on School Improvement status. A-7 A Good Night's Sleep

Attendees will learn about healthy sleep habits for children and adolescents and ways to encourage youth to start and maintain these habits over time. The seminar will also review common sleep problems, their symptoms, and common treatment strategies to assist our youth in obtaining quality sleep. Format will include lecture, question/answer session, and group discussion. Handouts on developing good sleep habits and how to handle sleep problems will be provided. A-8 Apple Juice or Air Freshener? Deadly Look-Alikes

Did you ever think that to a child blue Windex looks just as delicious as Blue Gatorade? The fact is that the world can be confusing and dangerous to young explorers. Ninety-two percent of household poisonings occur in the home with common everyday products, and half of those are in children under the age of six. This presentation will highlight the very real and significant problem of household poisonings, some common poisons around the house that many people never think about, and what parents and caretakers can do to prevent such deadly accidents.

A-9 Beyond Everything: A Guide to Effective Behavior Management for Parents Who Have Tried Everything

To be most effective, parents need to learn to use a variety of skills and methods together in a coordinated manner. This session will examine some of the strategies and principles that are critical in helping parents get "beyond everything" and achieve their parenting goals. Some general strategies and principles can help parents understand which methods to choose, how to put them into action, and why they work. In addition, specific parenting skills and methods for improving oppositional behaviors so children can learn more effectively will be explored. B-1 Toyota Family Literacy/Together We Learn

This program draws parents into schools by providing English classes, strategies for homework and parenting issues, and an opportunity to learn alongside their child. Parents develop a sense of belonging in their child's school as they learn together. This presentation will provide an explanation of the four program components, as well as discuss the Toyota grant process and how to replicate on a smaller scale without funding. Participants in this session will be exposed to new or different ideas about how to involve parents academically. B-2 Why and How to be an All-Pro Dad

Studies consistently show that when a father is engaged in his child's life, that child is happier, smarter, healthier and more likely to succeed. The lack of father involvement is directly related to incarceration, drug abuse, alcoholism, teen pregnancy, dropping out, suicide and many other harmful behaviors. All Pro Dad is committed to positive father involvement through monthly All Pro Dad's Day breakfasts, All Pro Dad events at stadiums around the country, and daily emails to fathers on important topics related to their relationships with their children and their spouse. The purpose of this presentation is to introduce you to why a father's involvement is so important and how All Pro Dad programs can help. Information will also be presented on the IMOM program to aid mothers in their involvement with their children.

B-4 Shaken Baby Syndrome/ Abusive Head Trauma

B-5 National Standards for Family-School Partnerships

Working with leading experts on parent involvement and school-community partnerships, PTA has updated its National Standards for Parent/Family Involvement Programs to reflect recent research and improve parent and community involvement practices. The updated National Standards shift the focus from what schools should do to involve parents to what parents, schools, and communities can do together to support student success. To reflect this change, the standards have been renamed the National Standards for Family-School Partnerships. B-6 Classroom Struggles & Strategies for the Student with Asperger's Syndrome



The student with Asperger's Disorder (AD) often has a difficult time in the school setting. Problems with behavioral regulation, social impairments and repetitive/sterotypic behaviors can get in the way of the student's (and

his classmates') learning. The goal of this presentation is to explain primary characteristics of the student with Asperger's Disorder and how these symptoms manifest specifically in the classroom setting. Behavioral strategies for dealing with AD symptoms, suggestions for teaching accommodations and practical suggestions for structuring the classroom will be discussed. This presen-

Fathers, stepfathers, grandfathers and uncles are asked to spend at least one day at their student's school volunteering, monitoring the school property, working one-on-one or in small groups, providing study/homework assistance, refereeing sports, just listening, or whatever needs to be done to plant seeds of success for students.

C-3 A Secondary School Parental Involvement Program That Works




In these economic times, families are struggling with layoffs, bills and feeding their families on limited incomes. Families can take measures to survive by buckling down on spending to
